Volunteering has been one of the greatest joys and I encourage everyone to help! I promise you the GVDS club will give back to you more than you can ever give to them!!!








Who is excited for the RMDS Championships?

A Judge's View from C Symposium and Clinic

The weather gods were with the Judge's View from C Symposium and Ride-a-Test Clinic, sponsored by USDF and Grand Valley Dressage Society. Two days of near perfect spring weather at the Stirrup Cup Farms facility in Delta, Colorado, with the fabulous Debbie Riehl-Rodriguez as our instructor, made the event receive rave reviews from the thirty-five participants in attendance.

The first day, Debbie reviewed all of the 2023 test changes in the morning and then instructed the participants in what judges look form on various movements, using a diverse group of horses at each level.

We had excellent demonstration riders that were able to show differences in gaits and certain aspects which may be penalized (a lateral walk); or gain more points (more suspension in the trot.)

Debbie also helped to clarify why accuracy with test riding is so important. Not riding accurately avoids the difficulty of the movement. (e.g A larger circle than 10 m avoids the difficulty of the movement by not showing the proper amount of bend a 10 meter circle requires) and therefore is scored lower.

The second day was broken into 30 minute ride-a-test sessions, where riders could ride the test of their choice and receive feedback on critical aspects that could improve their test scores. Nearly all participants riding tests from Introductory to 3rd level chose to have Debbie give them a lesson on the areas they could improve rather than try to ride the test a second time. Everyone was so happy with the instruction they received and more than one exclaimed it was the best clinic they'd ever attended.

Many thanks to USDF for their grant and Grand Valley Dressage Society's support to help make this valuable event affordable for our members.
