George Williams Clinic Recap

We had an amazing clinic with master trainer and coach, George Williams. Many thanks to Heather Petersen for organizing, and to Hobby Horse Farms for hosting. George is a world-renown Grand Prix rider and coach, clinician, and volunteer. In fact, he is the current president of USDF! During his career, he rode and trained at the Tempel Lipizzans for 20 years. He was a competitor with the US Equestrian Team and now currently travels to teach clinics and is the US Equestrian Dressage Youth and Pipeline Coach. George has worked tirelessly to promote dressage in the US, and in an interview with Sidelines magazine, he said that he believes it's very important to give back to the sport. Based in Wellington, Florida, and Charlottesville, Virginia, he operates Williams Dressage with his wife Roberta. Dressage is a family affair for the Williams--his daughter Noel is a Grand Prix rider like her dad. While George has had an extremely illustrious career, working with top riders in

the nation, he is a low-key, unassuming, no-fuss kind of man. He is soft-spoken, supportive, encouraging, kind, and approachable. No question is too "dumb" for him. In fact, he encouraged both riders and auditors to share their ideas and questions with him. He took the time to explain in layman's terms the foundations of dressage.

Clinic Takeaway: Contact and Connection

During the Clinic, George explained the difference between Contact and Connection, commenting that this is something that coaches talk about a lot with their students.

Contact is just that--just what it sounds like, which is pressure on the rein. When the horse accepts contact, the horse will yield to it and the rider can then bend and turn and the rider can perform simple movements.

Connection is much more about engaging the power of the hind legs so that the horse is stepping forward to the bit. You must have contact before you can have connection. During the clinic, George asked the riders to ride their horses "into the bridle," and to avoid pulling on the reins. Connection has more to do with throughness and the use of the horse's back. When the horse gets fussy in the mouth, people often think it's a contact problem, but it can actually mean that the horse is no longer pushing from the hind legs.

Thanks to George for the outstanding coaching. Pictured below are our auditors, George and Heather, lunchtime with Diangy and Mary, and George coaching. It was a great day and everyone lucky enough to be there learned much.
